Intended learning outcomes and competences

Students prepare a written homework assignment, which is presented and discussed in a colloquium. The aim of this course work is to demonstrate that the students are able to independently review a topic, to outline their findings in a structured manner, as well as to critically evaluate the literature. The colloquium provides participants with an opportunity to develop their presentation skills in an academic context by preparing an oral presentation of their work and creating the appropriate presentation materials.

Upon completing the module, students are able to:

- independently research an academic topic in a short span of time,
- prepare written or oral presentations of their literature review,
- understand and apply the rules of scientific writing,
- outline the steps in the process of preparing an academic paper,
- conduct a literature review independently, analyze findings critically and cite sources appropriately (both in written work and in presentations),
- apply techniques of academic communication to transmit knowledge,
- discuss critically the work of their peers,
- reflect on their own working process.

Key competencies:

- Academic work
- Independent preparation
- Problem solving
- Critical thinking
- Analytical skills
- Willingness to learn and accomplish
- Oral and written expression

Content:

The topics of the homework will be determined by the main lecturer in Economics at the beginning of each semester. The colloquia assist the study of academic techniques beyond the project theses included in the curriculum and prepare participants for challenges they are likely to face in the workplace.

Lectures, group work, case studies, self-study, student presentations.

B.Sc. Economics, B.Sc. Business Administration, B.A. Philosophy, Politics and Economics, B.Sc. Financial and Actuarial Mathematics

Admission to one of the following Bachelor programs: "Economics", "Business Administration", "Philosophy, Politics and Economics" or "Financial and Actuarial Mathematics".

The module is completed successfully, if the examination at the end of the module is passed with at least "sufficient" (4,0). The participation in the sessions of the course may be compulsory according to the preferences of the lecturer in charge. If you register for a project thesis, the rules of the corresponding optional compulsory course should be adhered to.
